If taken as percentages of all people living with HIV, the 90-90-90 targets translate as 90% of all people living with HIV to be diagnosed, 81% of all people living with HIV are on treatment and 73% of all people living with HIV are virally suppressed. In 2018, it was estimated that there are 103 800 people living with HIV in the UK.

In 35% of countries with available data, over 50% of people report having discriminatory attitudes towards people living with HIV.¹ Stigma and discrimination also makes people vulnerable to HIV.
